# HOW TO LOAD THE COVERT

oading the programs couldn't be easier! Type RUN" (followed by RETURN) and press a key to start the tape. (A shortcut way to get RUN" is to hold down CONTROL and tap the small ENTER key.)

A menu screen will appear in a short time. Select the program you wish to load. Press SPACE to highlight the program you want followed by RETURN to load the program. The Firelord and Seymour Take One are on side one of the tape. Football Forecaster, Fonts and the games pokes are on side two. Turn the tape over and rewind to the begining to load these programs.

So that we can pack as much as possible on to the covertage, we use a special menu/loader system. This means that all the games and demos use the same loader - you have to load the menu first, then select the game you want. (Disk users note)

Some programs, however, are written in BASIC, and although they appear on the menu, they can also be loaded seaparately. Indeed, if you select one of these from the menu, you will be told to quit back to BASIC and then load the program.

Note that this month Football Forecaster, Fonts and the pokes must be loaded directy from BASIC (with the RUN" command).

 If you have a disk drive connected to your machine you'll first have to type ITAPE to switch the machine to tape loading rather than disk loading. (The 1 is obtained by pressing SHIFT and @) The computer will load the next program.



# FOOTBALL FORECASTER


Won anything on the pools lately? Well, this program, from reader Mannan Ali, could just improve your chances...

football Forecaster lets you do a variety of very interesting things. First of all, you can keep track of your favourite team – in fact all football teams, for that matter – regularly updating the stats after each Saturday's games.

You start off by creating your own data file, storing information on as many or as few teams as you like.

If all that seems a bit of a bind, though, Mannan has included a full set of team results from the first third of this year's season.

Having got your data file set up, team stats can be edited at will (via option B on the main menu) and new teams added when required (A).



 Football Forecaster will let you keep track of your favourite football team and even make pools predictions!

But that's not all! Fact fiends can rearrange all teams into descending points order (highestscoring teams at the top).

You can also check to see whether a team is on your list, get all sorts of team info, save and load your data and produce forecasts for forthcoming matches.

There's plenty of prompting throughout the program to tell you what's going on, plus an Info file (N on the main menu) to explain in detail what the program does. Cool, huh?

# Tape won't work?

We hope that your covertape will load first time. However, having worked with computers for as long as we have, we know that things don't always go like clockwork. If you have problems loading the tape, try the following:

- Try loading at several different volume levels if you're using an external tape recorder. Computers can be very fussy about the volume they will load at.
   Clean the tape heads. This can be done
- Clean the tape heads. This can be done with any commercially available cleaning kit. Alternatively, use a cotton bud soaked in alcohol. Gently rub the surface of the heads and pinch roller to remove that layer of accumulated grime.
- Adjust the cassette recorder's head alignment. The alignment screw is located

just to the left of the tape head, and is usually accessible through a small hole. Rotate it a fraction at a time with a jeweller's screwdriver. When the crispest sound is heard, the alignment is spot on.

Sometimes the tape spools can jam or stick at a critical moment. Check the spools in your cassette rotate freely, if necessary giving the casing a slight tap against a table edge just to make sure. If, after trying the all of the above, you still can't get the tape to load then you can return it for a replacement. Send the tape, along with an SAE to:

However, they won't load into last month's covertape program Pagemaker Plus-T. This is because that program was specially adapted to run from tape. Sorry about that!

The font loading program will load the fonts into your CPC's memory, replacing the standard character set.

# DISK DRIVE OWNERS READ THIS!

f you have a disk drive, you'll no doubt find the prospect of loading everything from tape daunting. Thanks to our special tape to disk transfer program, you'll only ever have to load from the tape once – all programs are transferred easily to disk.

Insert a blank formatted disk into the drive and the covertape at the start of side one into your cassette player. Connect the REM socket if you have one (6128 owners) - it'll automatically stop the tape in the right places when accessing the disk drive.

Load the menu program in the normal way and select the TRANSFER TO DISK option. Follow the on-screen instructions and press a key when the computer asks you to. It's as simple as that! Should you experience problems you'll be asked to rewind the tape and try again. Don't panic if this happens - follow the advice for tape loading troubles.

# DISK OFFER


All the programs on the Amstrad Action covertape are easily transferable to disk. However, owners of the 6128 Plus are unable to connect a cassette recorder to their machines, and some of the rest of you may experience loading difficulties.

We've come to a special arrangement with our duplicators. For a small charge to cover costs, they will supply a disk containing all the programs we're giving away on the tape. • Note that when running covertape programs from disk you should type RUN'MENU. While some of the programs may be written in BASIC, others (principally games and game demos) will be written in machine code. These can only be loaded via the main menu—they do not have loaders of their own.

Games publisher goes up for sale as Maxwell empire topples...


s the various intrigues and goings-on in the Maxwell empire continue to emerge after the big man's death, some of the company's subsidiaries are starting to suffer.

Mirrorsoft is one of Maxwell's two computer ventures - the other is a distributor called Rushware in Germany.

The administrators have been called in and are currently trying to sell Mirrorsoft as a going concern. However, the Q company's assets have been frozen and the administrators are in touch with creditors.

Whatever the current crisis, it seems likely that Mirrorsoft will survive in one form or another, either following a management buy-out or offers from other companies.

It would be sad indeed if Mirrorsoft didn't continue. It's one of the comparatively few publishers still supporting the CPC with full-price software. Indeed, it produced what should prove to be one of the biggest games this Christmas -Turtles 2: the Coin-op, as well as the first home

# **Future of charts** in doubt

There may be a change in the way the software charts are compiled. depending on the outcome of discussions between ELSPA - the European Leisure Software Publishers Association - and the rest of the industry.

Until now, ELSPA has commissioned Gallup to prepare software charts based on retail sales, but a new plan is being discussed whereby ship-out figures - the number of copies of games ordered by retailers, rather than the number actually sold - are used. The latest computerised stock systems allow accurate tracking of products - including unsold returns.

The advantage of ship-out figures is that the major distributors only are involved, rather than thousands of individual retailers (it's effectively impossible to poll them all). Therefore, all sales will be accounted for, leading to greater accuracy and a better overall picture.

However, ELSPA hasn't made a final decision yet. In the meantime, AA will be running its own charts, based on those sent in by our



Who is this idiot Philip Ridgeon (AA74) and his virus? I

suggest he's the one with the virus and it's in his head. Doesn't he know a virus is a program that attaches itself to other programs and can change or format a disk, erase programs etc. But they can't affect ROMs, being read-only, you'd need an Eprom and blower for that.

A virus is usually only found on hard disks or diskettes. The hard disk variety is lethal and can rewrite the F.A.T. (File Allocation Table) or delete sectors, change COM files and so on. The diskette variety, such as on the Amiga, usually either formats the diskette or erases needed data. Yet so many children now are being allowed to discard their computers in favour of facile games machines. How will a children learn anything of value or worth sat in front of a Megadrive or NES? They can't type in their

The price of the games is also a worry. Whereas CPC games can be picked up for £1 or less (Big Box, Quattro packs, AA cover tapes, etc), from £20 to £50. But as the time for this economic revolution draws nearer, the press and the politicians are getting ever more vague about what it involves. So what is it, how will it affect our lives – and what does it mean for the CPC?

he European computer market is weird.


Surely, if a machine is good it'll do well
everywhere? Apparently not. Different
nationalities take to different machines, er... differently.

Take the Speccy, for example. The British took this ghastly little beast to their hearts in the mid-'80s. So much so that it's been the biggest seller of all the 8-bit micros in the UK. Yet on the continent? Not a sausage. Those canny Europeans won't touch it with a bargepole.

The CPC is different. It's done pretty well in the UK since its launch, but nothing like as well as it's done in France. According to current industry estimates there are anything up to a million CPCs in France!

After France, Spain is the next strongest CPC market across the pond. Italy? Not many. Germany? A few more, but again the machine didn't really take off in the same big way it did in France and the UK.

But even though the CPC did well in France and the UK, the two markets are still quite differ-



ent. In the UK, approximately half of the CPCs out there are tape machines. The French, however, went almost exclusively for the 6128. That's partly due to the differences in the way the machines have been promoted in the two countries (Amstrad France works separately to Amstrad UK), but mainly because the markets are just so different.

The main difference is that the cassette is such a popular format in the UK. All three 8-bit machines – the CPC, Spectrum and Commodore 64 – will load from tape, and all publishers produce tape versions of games.

The French, however, don't seem to like tapes. Not one bit. Which is good if you own a disk machine, since there aren't the same problems getting hold of disk versions of games (many AA readers report trouble finding disk games). The bad side is that if you don't have tapes, how can you release games on budget?

Quite. Indeed, the French don't actually have a budget market to speak of at all. Which makes it all the more amazing that the CPC should still be such a popular format in France. After all, it's been assumed that the 8-bit machines in the UK have been kept going beyond their expected sell-by date by the strong budget market in this country. While full-price releases are dropping off, the budget market remains very active, especially with re-released full-price games. Why has the French market kept going without these budget sales?

## The bad news...

Of course, even in France the CPC won't keep going for ever - no machine does. But amongst the French software houses there is some disagreement as to how long it will keep going. Ubi Soft, for example, is less than optimistic, as a spokesperson explained:

"The CPC market in France is still quite strong with certain titles, but it's declining a lot. When there is a good game, people will buy it and it will have good sales on the Amstrad, but it is declining and for us, as a publisher, it's not really worthwhile. It's very expensive to convert a game on to the Amstrad, and it's difficult to ge the money back.

"There is no budget market in France. I don't understand why there should be no budget market, it's not very logical to me. Maybe it's because the retailers don't want it, I don't know."

# ...And the good news!

That's only part of the picture. Loriciels' version is quite different:

"Basically, to be honest, Amstrad, at the moment, is still 40-45 per cent of our sales! Atari is 20 per cent, PC is 20 per cent and Amiga is only 10 per cent.

"It [the Amstrad market] should be declining, but Loriciels is still doing games for the CPC because it sells so much!

"The console has flopped! In some places now it's down to about ten quid, and it's doing really badly. They put the price much too high at the beginning, and it got a bad image."

We asked, "are you going to carry on producing games for the standard CPC?"

"Definitely."

## **Amstrad PC International**

This is an altogether weightier magazine. It doesn't just cover the CPC but the PC and the PCW too. Those Teutonic types don't really go for jazzy games coverage, but are more interested in serious applications.

The current issue of Amstrad PC International has an article on meteorology and weather satellites (what's the German for déjà vû? – see AAxx!), plus loads of stuff on programming and assembler language plus a natty-looking hardware project to build a sound digitiser. The German market may not be so hot for games publishers, but there's clearly a very active serious/hobbyist user base over there.

Amstrad PC International covers the PC and PCW too, but the CPC gets the lion's share of the mag. •





The story with the new Amstrads was the same everywhere. The console flopped, the Plus sold poorly. But still the CPC soldiers on...

the CPC market, everyone is agreed on the GX4000 and the Plus models. The GX4000 flopped. Things went a bit better in France for the Plus machines, much as they did over here, but Amstrad's relaunch was still something of a non-event.

The problems were much the same in France as the UK. The French software houses think the GX4000 cost too much compared to the competition – the Sega Master System and the Nintendo Entertainment System. True, the GX4000 did weigh in at up to £30 more than these veteran 8-bit machines. But a more telling factor was the lack of software support. You could then, and still can, buy Sega and Nintendo games anywhere. You can now buy them in Tescos, for heaven's sake! But where could you buy Amstrad games?

The problem seemed to be that Amstrad seemed to do only half a job in persuading publishers to write console games. Then there was so much slippage that few games were actually available by the launch date. Then publishers were reporting that the duplication process was taking months rather than weeks. The last straw was that when games did come out, it was in a kind of weedy trickle rather than a great rush. The things were simply not commonly available.

Of course, it doesn't take dealers long to get cold feet, and as soon as Dixons and the other major retail chains saw that the machine wasn't going well, they dropped it. And that was the end of the GX4000.

The Plus has done a little better, since it does more than just play (non-existent) console games. However, has it sold any more than the old CPC would have done?

## **Future prospects**

It's very difficult to get accurate sales figures for computers. But there would appear to be towards a million CPCs in France and at least half that number in the UK. That's one hell of a lot of machines. And while many software publishers are muttering darkly about pulling out of the CPC market – particularly in the UK – can they really afford to ignore all those machines out there? Will they?

Just as interesting is the fact that the UK has a strong budget market, while France has a strong full-price market. Now with trade barriers soon to disappear, making inter-European trade (we like big words here) both easier and cheaper, maybe both the publishers and the computer users can benefit from 1992, and the Single European Market. Only time will tell...

# FRENCH MAGAZINES

## Amstrad Cent Pour Cent Amstrad Cent Pour Cent is Erappe's equivalent of Ametr

Amstrad Cent Pour Cent is France's equivalent of Amstrad Action. Like AA, it's the principle CPC-only mag, and it's

been leading the market for years. It's got a similar mix of serious and games coverage to AA, and has letters, news, game reviews, game hints, listings, machine code tutorials (!), BASIC programming and various general features. The issue illustrated has an article on fanzines, which are apparently huge in France. There are, it seems, hundreds of the things. Cent Pour Cent has recently gone from monthly to bi-monthly (every two months). A bad sign? Possibly. The CPC is on the decline in France, but the market is still a big one – maybe French magazine publishers are obsessed with the 'sexier' 16-bit machines.

# **Multiformat** mags

While Cent pour Cent magazine is apparently on the wane, the multi-format magazines in France still cov er the CPC well (unlike in the UK!) Magazines with CPC and console coverage include Joystick, Joypad, Tilt, Micro News and Player One. The CPC is not just still going in France, it's alive and kicking!

# SO WHAT'S 1992 ALL ABOUT, THEN?

1992 is all about the idea of a common Europe, a kind of superstate consisting of all the European countries working in economic unison. In theory, the European community will have no borders, a single currency and a single set of economic and defence policies.

In practice, though, things aren't that simple. John Major came back from the Maastricht summit being hailed as a conquering hero, but what has actually been achieved?

Well, we can look forward to a Europe without frontiers, but we won't be getting a common European currency just yet. And when it does arrive, Britain won't necessarily be using it...

All the other stuff, like political procedures, common enconomic and defence policies... well, don't hold your breath.

The main points of agreement are still vague, and

it's going to be years before any of them will come into force.

So is '1992' all a big con, then? Up until last year it was being hailed as a revolution in Europe, the shape of things to come. Now it's just looking like another great heap of Euro-twaddle, destined to be forgotten about by the time it's implemented.

But Europe is slowly opening up as an international marketplace. The removal of international barriers is going to make trade between countries both easier and cheaper. Many British software houses already make a tidy sum out of the strong CPC market in France, and British CPC owners can expect to see more French imports in the future.

Although the full political implications of 1992 may take several years to filter through the process, the commercial benefits could be felt a great deal sooner.

# Parlez-vous Français?

France might have the biggest and most active CPC market in Europe, but what good does it do us over here if all the software is in French?

ortunately for us, English is more commonly spoken in France than French is in this country!

And most French games/programs come with English instructions too. Take a look at most arcade games and you'll realise that the game-play usually speaks for itself. As long as the manual can tell you what's supposed to be happening, you can work out the rest.

The problems arise with technical programs or adventure games, where there may be onscreen instructions or menus. Then, it's a question of whether the software house concerned thinks it's worth doing a special English version - which is bound to involve quite a lot of reprogramming.

There's another problem too. A French software house will need to come to some arrangement with a UK company over distribution before it can sell its games over here. Needless to say, distribution in the UK costs money, albeit not necessarily any more than it would in France. On top of that, though, are the various taxes and duties levied on imports.

That last factor is the one most likely to be affected by '1992', and it may make the difference between French companies exporting their software and simply not bothering.

# **UBI SOFT**

Ubi Soft is much less keen on the CPC than Loriciels, but still proposes to produce CPC games when the right title comes along.

Certainly, Ubi Soft has scored some notable successes in the UK when it's decided to distribute stuff over here. The interest in the epic role--playing adventure *Iron Lord* was huge, even before an English translation was prepared. And the futuristic role-playing game *BAT*

scored a Mastergame in AA and also did well with the public.

More recently, Ubi Soft has produced Equinoxe, (83%, AA75), a fascinating new music package for the CPC. It's the first serious release from a major publisher for some time. Will there be any more? We shall have to wait and see. But maybe European publishers will wake up to the fact that the CPC market may be twice as large once Europe becomes a single economic community. It's a nice thought.

# LORICIELS

This is one French company that doesn't think the CPC is on its way out! With something like 40 per cent of its total software sales on this one format (twice as much as any other single format), Loriciels is not only "definitely" continuing to produce games for the CPC, it is looking to distribute them in the UK. First to be released will be Baby Jo, but two more titles in the offing – subject to distribution deals being struck – are puzzle game Guardians and shoot-em-up Thunderburner

Loriciel hasn't quite given up on the console, either. Look out soon for the long-awaited Copter 271 and Panza Kick Boxing. More on these hot new titles when we have it.

Still, the growing flood of excellent demos from the continent shows that there is a highly active, enthusiastic and skilled user base out there. The CPC may be a few years old, and in the 'autumn of its years', but with so many fans it could go on for ages yet.





# Disk list

You have, in the last few months, given a couple of Type-Ins that can print a catalogue of the files on a disk. It is possible to get such a list using the standard utilities supplied with the CPC disk drive. It uses the commands of the CP/M operating system suppled with CPC disk drives and so is probably less well known than in Amsdos. Try the following:

Insert your CP/M system disk into the disk drive and type | CPM. You will get an unpleasant light-blueish screen in mode 2 and the CP/M prompt A>.

Hold down the CTRL key and press 'P'. From now on you will get a printed copy of everything that appears on the screen – provided your printer is connected and on-line. Press CTRL 'P' again to switch it off.

Type DIR. A list of file names will now appear on your screen and on your printer.

(DIR is CP/M-speak for CAT.) Repeat this for any other disk you want a printout of.

The slight downside of this method is that the DIR command in CP/M does not tell you the file sizes or the free space that you get with typing CAT. This can be overcome by copying the CP/M program STAT.COM onto your disk and then typing the command STAT
\*.\* instead of DIR. This gives a lot more information about the disk and its files.

Sadly the info in the user instructions is very brief, and does not tell you what the columns "Recs" and "Ext" mean. Any ideas?







- 3. In machine code I understand that a negative number is shown by setting the most significant bit high. Can you explain how this is affected by multiplying and whether the number will stay negative?
- 4. My trip through the world of machine code is slowing and needs speeding up Perhaps you, in your infinite wisdom, could recommend a good, quite advanced book on the subject that I could use to press the accelerator.
- 5. I have Arnor's Maxam assembler (which is



very good) and would like to know whether it's possible to disassemble code into the editor to a BASIC/assembly language program and not just to the printer or screen. I have contacted Arnor but they say you cannot. Could a far more able coder be able to solve my problem?

1. Proper random numbers are incredibly complicated and require horrendously complicated maths routines to produce numbers that appear to be random (and even then

they're not actually truly random). Within machine code I've always found it far easier to use the refresh register, especially if it's just for games or an application like that.

If someone has a simple way to come up with random numbers, then let the world know...

 Blimey, you don't ask for much, do you? Multiplication in machine code is another pain. Basically you have to take into account that multiplication of two 16-bit numbers will yield a 32-bit result.

Repetitive addition is the way to do it. One of the numbers should act at as a counting loop, and the other should be constantly added until the sum is completed. Here's a simulation in BASIC:

10 input n1,n2

20 n3=0

30 IF n1=0 THEN PRINT n3:STOP

40 n3=n3+n2

50 n1=n1-1

68 GOTO 38

- Again this would have to be taken into account by your multiplication program.
- 4. Keep on reading the machine code series. It should keep you on your toes!

Screen shrinking

I own a 464 Plus and I am trying to write my own game. I have a couple of questions I wish to ask.

How do you cancel the actions of the Control, Shift and Esc keys reseting the computer as in a lot of

new games?
2. In some games, eg Dizzy 4, the border has been enlarged and the main game screen looks

as if it has been shrunk. How is this achieved?

I'm fairly new to computing and AA has been a help!

It's only really possible to get rid of the reset keys using machine code.

Every 50th of a second the computer generates an interrupt and stops what it's doing. It takes the opportunity to do things like play music, scan the keyboard and check for a reset.

Should you get into machine code, the way to prevent the reset keys from working is to stop the interrupt routine or rewrite it in such a way so that it doesn't do the reset check. The interrupt routine resides at address &38 and putting the byte &C9 (for a RET instruction) will prevent the routine from being carried out. This does mean that the computer won't do any of its other 'housekeeping' routines, though.

 The screen has actually been shrunk to aid the conversion of games originally written on the Spectrum to work on the CPC. The Speccy has a smaller screen, and so by reducing the screen display to this size on the Amstrad it's possible to port games across more easily.

It's done by sending a couple of instructions to the video chip. Something a little like this:

IN BORDER 6

20 OUT &BC00,1

38 OUT &BD00,32

48 OUT &BC88,6

50 OUT ABD00,24

This sets the screen to be Speccy size; 32 characters wide by 24 deep. Alter these values to make the screen whatever size you desire. Some quite flashy screen clearing effects can be made with a bit of experimentation.

# Is that clear

If, like me, you own a 464 and get annoyed with not being able to use programs written in BASIC 1.1 then this tip may be of use. Often the only difference is a few CLEAR

INPUT commands. This can be solved by replacing them with CALL &BD19.

Is it possible to to get a lead made up so that I can link Plus peripherals to a CPC? The reason I ask is that I intend to upgrade to a 6128 Plus and with a Multiface II I'd like to transfer all the programs to disk.

# In control

While experimenting with my CPC464 I discovered something that might be of interest to other readers. Firstly, type in a short program like this:

10 CLS 20 MODE 1 30 PRINT "xHELLO"

Replace the 'x' by holding down CTRL and pressing one of the letter keys. A character should appear. When the program is run, weird things happen. For instance pressing CRTL 'G' causes the computer to beep, CTRL 'X' changes the colour around the word 'HELLO'. There are plenty of other effects too!

# **Basic editing**

I have a hint for any budding BASIC programmers who write fairly substantial programs. It isn't actually all that complicated at all but I haven't seen it anywhere before.

One thing lacking from the CPC's version of BASIC are really extensive editing features. Sure, you can renumber lines and edit them one-by-one, but what you need for some of those big programs is some real editing power.

Any text editor that can import/export ASCII files can edit a BASIC program. To do this, simply save your BASIC program with the command:

SAVE "filename", A

The 'A' suffix is the important bit - this saves the BASIC program as an ASCII text file

rather than the normal BASIC format that a word processor would find unrecognisable.

Now all the features normally available in your word processor for text files can be used from your program. If you have a spell checker you can even check for typing errors by adding the BASIC keywords to your dictio-

When you've finished, just save the file as ASCII and you'll be able to load it as a BASIC program. I hope some of your readers find this

# Time for interruptions

I have a few questions to ask and I hope that you will be able to answer them. Here they are:

- 1. Is it possible to create a real-time clock in BASIC which can run independently while another program is running?
- 2. Is it possible to change the media of a disk within its tracks, i.e. so that the first few tracks are data format, followed by a few tracks as system format and then going back to data format again? (I know it's possible as DISCKIT3 gives

this information when it occurs.)

- 3. What is 'protected binary'?
- 4. Some of my software files come up, when I catalogue them, as FILENAME.BAS\*. What is the significance of the asterisk?
- 5. Is it possible to link an electronic keyboard (such as the Yamaha PSR-18) to my 6128 via the earphones socket of the keyboard and the tape socket of my 6128?

1. The Amstrad computers have a built-in set of interrupts that can be used from BASIC. These allow a program to be interrupted and another subroutine to take over. If you set the interrupt routine to update a clock display then that should do pretty much what you want.

The EVERY command is used to set the interrupts going. It works in increments of a 50th of a second. A program not unlike this is the sort of thing you need:

10 secs=0

20 EVERY 50 GOSUB 1000

30 REM The rest of your program goes here ...

1000 secs=secs+1 1010 LOCATE 1.1 1020 PRINT Secs 1030 RETURN

Obviously it needs some work to do exactly what you want, but that should start you off.

- 2. It sounds horribly complicated and I'm not sure why you'd want to do such a thing. But, if anyone has come up with a way to do it then I'd be delighted to spread the word.
- 3. Protected binary is a block of machine code that's been saved using custom routines so that it cannot be accessed from normal BASIC programs; you'll need to use a special machine code loader to run it. Commercial games tend to have their code protected, to prevent hackers and pirates from copying the program - publishers reckon on losing millions to piracy.
- 4. The asterisk means that the file is read-only and cannot be erased. It's a safeguard to prevent you accidentally erasing important data. Use the CP/M SET command to protect your own files.
- 5. I guess you could, but it wouldn't serve that much purpose as far as I can see. You'd be able to perhaps digitize music with some sound sampling software, but you won't be able to transmit data to control the synth if that's what you're after. AA

Welcome to part VI of Mastering Machine Code. Did you get lots of games for Christmas? And have you played them to death by now? Well, how about writing your own? This month we look at some routines to move sprites around the screen. ANDY PRICE delves deep into his assembler...

hat is a sprite? Well, when playing a game, the character you control and the baddies you have to fight, be it a plane or a person, is a sprite. A sprite is just a lump of memory displayed in graphical form on the screen.

Wouldn't it be a great idea if you lot, instead of using letter characters for your home-made games, could design your own little sprites on the screen in full colour and then move them about? There is no great secret to doing this, it is just a complex variation on the LDIR instruction (to move blocks of code) which was discussed in the last instalment.

# The sprite utility

Listing One is a comprehensive sprite utility which allows you to:

- Design your sprites on the screen, or in any art package which will let you load your screens from BASIC – and the sprite utility will let you move any part of that screen (a sprite) around your game screen.
- Design sprites of any pixel width and height.
- Display your sprite set at any time.
- Copy your sprite screen into the utility's sprite bank.
- Accomplish all of this from BASIC or machine code, using CALL commands from machine code or RSX commands from BASIC.

Explanations of the program, line by line, have been written into the assembly code. Also, a demonstration program has been written into the utility to show you how to use the sprite program.

The utility has several RSX commands, which were the subject of part IV. You can add your own RSX commands at any time to improve the program, if you wish to do so.

# The commands, how they work

The program has four routines built into it, which are accessed by simple RSX commands. They are as follows:

ISPRBANK This saves the screen on which you designed your sprites into memory at address &4000. From this address the utility will grab the sprites you have chosen to use and display them on the screen.

IDISPLAY This displays the sprite bank. This is written into the program merely to act as a reminder.

ISPRITE This is the core of the utility. This piece of code allows you to manipulate your sprites around the screen. Its use is a little more detailed than the other commands, but allows pixel precision (dependent on the MODE) for placing your sprites on the screen, just like the software houses do. The command takes the following format:

# ISPRITE, height, width, store, address

The parameters it takes are height, which is the height of the sprite in pixels, width, which is the width of the sprite in pixels, store, which is the address where the sprite is stored and address, which is the screen address where the sprite is to be placed.

# e.g. ISPRITE, 20, 35, &4000, &c000

This will place a sprite stored at address &4000 on to the screen at address &c000 which is 30 pixels high and 35 pixels wide.

In MODE 0, if a width of 4 is specified, that will print a sprite 8 pixels wide. Thus if 1 is passed, a sprite 2 pixels wide will be printed. In MODE 1, a width of 2 is 8 pixels wide and in MODE 2 a width of 1 is 8 pixels wide. This is because of the way more bytes are used to store a pixel in MODE 0 than in MODE 2 due to the chunkiness of the pixels in MODE 0. The height is always pixel precise, no matter which MODE you are in because there are identical numbers of pixels, height wise, in any MODE.

# Parameter passing - numbers

So far, with the CALL command and RSX com-

mands, we have only dealt with using addresses to call machine code routines. The CALL command can take more than one parameter and so can an RSX (which is just an extension of CALL).

These parameters are passed using the index registers, that is using IX+0 to IX+255. Let's take an example CALL command with one parameter:

## CALL &4000, &3020

This command calls address &4000 with the parameter &3020 (an integer variable). The integer is a 16-bit integer. When the routine at &4000 is called, the computer stores the number of parameters passed in the accumulator.

The integer &3020 will be stored in the index register, the low byte being stored in IX+00 (&20) and the high byte being stored in IX+01 (&30).

However, what if there is more than one parameter, as in the ISPRITE command? Well, this is where a little bit of thinking is needed, because it is very easy to make a simple mistake which will crash your program. Let us take a simple example:

# CALL &4000, &3020, &6000, &2000, &10

All parameters are still passed into the index register, but in a rather weird way (well, it is to me!). They are stored as follows, all in low byte - high byte order:

&2000 passed into IX+00 and IX+01 (low byte followed by high byte)

**&6000** passed into IX+02 and IX+03 **&3020** passed into IX+04 and IX+05

&10 IX+06 holds &10 and IX+07 holds &00 (treat as &0010)

# Parameter passing - strings

To pass strings on a 464 is a different matter to doing so on a 6128, but in principle the same applies to both systems and I will explain both.

If a string is needed to be passed, the actual string is NOT passed but the address where the string is stored IS passed. On a CPC 6128 it is just a matter of passing the string in quotation

marks, but for the CPC 464 it is a little more long-winded. For the 464, a string descriptor has to be used, which is the @ sign.

e.g. CPC 464

a\$="ANDY PRICE" CALL &4000, @a\$

e.g. CPC 6128

CALL &4000. "ANDY PRICE"

The @ symbol passes the address of the string. rather than the actual string. Thus, if you typed PRINT @as in BASIC, it will print the address where the string is stored, for machine code

The address passed is stored in the same way as the integer is stored, as explained above. Thus, the more strings you have, the more parameters are passed and the more index registers are used, as shown above.

This method was invaluable for creating the

# Sprite demonstration

Listing Two is a demonstration of how the utility can be used. The codes on the left of the listing are Typerighter code, the program used by Amstrad Action to let you check your typing when typing in BASIC listings from Type-ins.

To use the program, first type the program in (don't type in the codes - they're only for checking if you use Typerighter) and save the program. Secondly, type in the sprite utility and assemble it. Then re-load the demonstration program and RUN it.

enough to keep you busy for quite a while. 'Cos it's a joystick waggler, you really have to put all your energy into waggling as quickly as possible. Now and then you might worry about breaking your joystick and for a split second you'll stop waggling. At that point Mr Perfect will tip you over his perfect sholders and flop straight onto your stomach from a great height. It probably hurts a great deal, it's also virtually impossible to get out of. # Decide whether you want to be a goodie or baddie

This will affect everything you do in the ring. Goodies play by the rules and baddies cheat. Basically.

# Think up a really decent moniker

Baddles should go for place names where previous baddles have hung out – any German or Japanese town will do. Ideal names for goodles include anything with boy on the end – Jimmy Boy, for example.

Get your kit sorted out Goodies wear white, glitter, union jacks and briefs with their name embroidered on the back. Baddies look good in black, red, cloaks and masks.

# Devise your own personal move

This can be a bit tricky, so here's some ideas...

- The Crook Bouncer: Get your opponent on the floor and stretch his arms out. When they're straight, sit on his stomach and place each knee in the crook of his elbow. Raise yourself up and bounce up and down on your knees. Ouch!
- The Back Slam: Whilst your opponent is standing up, climb up onto the ropes and lunge forward, head-first, into his back. He'll go crashing to the floor

and, hopefully, won't be able to move for at least two hours. The main problem with this one is that you have to make sure your opponent doesn't move.

● The Head Bash Roll: Stand on one of the posts and your opponent will come over and try and knock you off. Choose your moment well and jump onto his shoulders. He'll try and knock you off by leaning forward, hold tight to his ears and roll between his legs. He'll then go crashing head-first onto the mat. His head'll hurt but you'll be okay cos you've just executed a perfect forward roll.

Note – these are moves that both goodies and baddies can use. The only difference is that baddies have to punch their opponents in the face at the same time.







- The compass shows current direction (not the direction of the current, you understand!).
- Under the compass is a weapon gauge selector. By using up and down you can select which weapon you want.
- The light switch below the compass lights the water in front of you. When your power runs down the light automatically cuts off.
- The switch with the letter P is used for controlling the depth. Up, down and neutral.
- Above is the ballast guage, it shows how much air is in the ballast tanks. Next to this is the depth.
- Below and to the right is a switch with the letter S. This, when pushed up, activates a magnet which pulls supplies from the bottom to your craft. In the middle is neutral and when down it sounds a horn which tells the ship above to drop supplies.
- Above the horn/magnet is a thrust switch up to go forward and down reverse.
- Opposite are the steering devices the left one alters the heading and the right one controls the tilt.
- The two arrow switches below turn the screen to the left or right. Next is the power of your craft. The guage on the top shows how much power remains. Below is a wheel which can be turned (by pressing up and down on the joystick) to generate power.
- The guage up to the right shows how much fuel remains.
- The final instrument on the panel is used to detonate bombs. Be careful you don't use this unless you are are a good distance away after dropping a bomb.
- Don't stay still for too long without moving or you will get a nasty thing stuck onto your screen. Use the purple flashing electric field to get if off before it kills you.
- Be careful how much power you use on the magnet, you could run out completely. If you do switch the magnet to neutral, boost to full power and get going as fast as you can.

#### **HERO QUEST**

James Hall of Tenbury Wells and Carl (I've heard that name before) Surry of Barnet has sent us some tips for Hero Quest. Hero goes...

 If your band of adventurers is in need of money or a bit low on energy (or both) after a hard-fought quest, do the following:

Start the quest called "The Stone Hunter". If you do nothing but exit the quest you will get 100 gold coins. Do this until each player has enough to buy all the weapons and armour they need.

Also, if you search the first four rooms there will be almost nothing to worry about. You may set off one booby trap or have one creature stalk up on you but nothing more than that should happen. In these four rooms you should find money and a potion of some sort. If you find the healing potion, use it before you exit the quest. Also, use the magic spells that can heal players before you exit.

By doing this five or six times all your players will be back to full strength and very rich indeed. Save the character before you start a new (full) quest though, just in case.

 Following this tip will leave the Wizard the richest of all the characters as he can only buy a staff and tool kit. If all the characters are well off get those that need one a tool kit. It

is needed to fix floor traps that
you might find. Another thing
that must be high on your
shopping list is any sort of
armour, i.e. helmet, chain
mail etc. (you
can get the
better weapons
later). This is
because the

characters tend
to attack better
than they defend.
It's much better to
get a strong defence
before you go too far.

Once you start to
get better weapons,

get better weapons,
equip a couple of
characters with
crossbows. These can
fire at any creature
that can be seen by
the character (on the
overall map) even if



#### **Using the Multiface**

The (t)s and (d)s before the address indicate whether the poke was written for a tape or disk game (they might work on both, its worth a try). Just in case you don't already how to put in these BLACK BOX POKES, here are the steps to success.

- a) Load the game as normal.

- I) Press "R" return to the game.




## GAC programmin

This month the Balrog continues adding to our bank adventure, started last issue, as well as telling you more about how to work *GAC*...

ot only are we going to add more locations to our bank adventure, we'll also be adding a puzzle (a locked bank vault door) and a maze!

Now let's add a maze – let's make it a sewer complex beneath the High Street...

Room 5 'You are in a dank sewer. You can see daylight above.'



First, let's add the extra locations:

Room 3 'You are outside the bank. Exits are north and west.'

Connections: N 2 W 4

Room 4 'You are on the the High Street. There is an exit to the east and you can go down to the sewers.'

Connections: E 3 D 5

and amend the old locations...

- Add the message 'The bank vault door lies open to the east.' (We're not going to allow the adventurer to close the vault, just open it) in Room 1.
- 2. Remove the exit 'west 1' from room 2 (as we'll be putting a door between these two locations) and add south 3. Also add to the end of the room description 'There is an exit to the south and a large bank vault door to the west.'

Connections: U 4 N 8 S 7 E

So let's go over what we've got now - we've added a lot more locations, including a four room sewer maze which should be good (and could be made a lot harder if you changed all the location descriptions to be the same!). Now, we still want to add the following:

- Start in room 8
- Put a key in room 8
- Add a door to Room 2
- Add a puzzle which lets you open the door with the key...
- Starting in room 8 is easy just go to the 'Begin where?' menu and change it to 8!

As to putting the key in room 8, follow the same approach as the bar of gold from last issue, i.e.:

Adding the door and the puzzle element is the complicated bit:

Add MESSAGE 3 'The door is wide open...'

add 'door', 'vault' and 'bank' as noun 3 and add the verb 'unlock' to the verb list (make it verb 18).

Now go the local room conditions and add a condition for room 2:

IF (VERB 4 AND SET? 3) GOTO 1 WAIT END

If you typed 'West' and marker/flag three is set (i.e. the door is open) the go to room 1 (the bank

Also, add IF (VERB 4) MESS 4 WAIT END to the list (if type go west and marker is not set then print message 4 (which we make 'You can't walk through doors you know!'))

And finally add:

IF (VERB 18 AND NOUN 3 AND CARR 2) SET 3 WAIT END

Which basically says if you typed 'UNLOCK DOOR' and you have the key on you then set the door to be unlocked.

Finally, we want to add the message about the door being open to the end of the room description, so we need to go to the high priority conditions menu and add:

1: IF (AT 2 AND SET? 3) MESS 3

And we should be ready to rock and roll! Pat yourself on the back if it works - Bank Adventure now looks much more like a proper adventure than the two location 'thing' we created last month! If it doesn't work then look at the errors box to see what you've done wrong...

Save it as a datafile called bank.

#### Editing and deleting things

To edit something (such as a room location or a condition), follow the procedure to enter it, and instead of empty lines to edit things on, you will get what was there before. To skip to the next part just press ENTER/RETURN. You are free to edit things as you go along, but don't press ESCAPE before you get to the "Which room/object/line number ...?" or your changes won't be kept!

To delete something, follow the procedure to enter it, but edit the first bit of data to be a blank line (i.e. no spaces). This can be done by repeatedly holding down the CLR key.

For example, to edit object one from 'a bar of gold' to read 'the mystical lost treasure of Nanu-Xanu', just press O from the main menu (for objects), choose object 1, edit the line using CLR, DEL and the cursor keys and then press Enter until the "Which object number?..." prompt appears at the bottom of the screen. Then just press Escape and the change will be committed to the computer's memory.

#### What is a marker/diagnostics?

Markers and counters (sometimes called flags or variables) are very important to any adventure game - without them, it would be very difficult to write even the simplest puzzle.

There are 256 markers, which can only be true or false. They are set by using the SET and RES commands (see example of the bank door above) - thus if marker 3 is set (true) then we say that the door is open, else if it is unset/reset (false) then the door is closed. Markers are tested using the SET? and RES? commands. These markers are very useful for puzzles which need to test if something is true or false (i.e. a door open/closed, night/dark, hungry/full etc.).

There are 128 counters, numbered from 0 to 127. They are most frequently used to store the number of moves since a particular event (e.g. in the dark) but could be used for keeping account of how many gold coins you have etc. Counter 0 holds the score and counters 126 and 127 hold the turns count since the start of the game.

When you are testing an adventure, the way to return to the main menu is to press the ESC key, as usual. This gives you the message "Press D for diagnostics or ESC to escape...". If you press the "D" key, then all the markers and counters will be displayed on the screen. For the markers, a filled circle indicates "SET" and an unfilled one "RESET". The values of the counter are given as you would expect. To get

#### Error messages - what they mean

Any adventure you write will develop bugs as you go along. Some of them more serious than others. There are several errors than can occur from within GAC and most of them will throw up one of the error messages listed helow:

Message not found - means exactly that, you haven't set up the message that the routine is referring to. If you get this immediately, check that you have loaded in the quickstart files (QS.ADV) as this has all the system messages.

Room not found - commonly caused when you have a GOTO to a non-existent room or a connection which leads to a room which has not yet been created.

Object not found - means that you have tried to pick up, drop or describe an object which doesn't exist.

Marker not found - Means you have tried to access a marker which does not exist.

Counter not found - means you have

tried to access a counter which does not exist.

Illegal value - means you have tried to look for a verb, noun, adverb etc with a number greater than is possible or have tried to load a counter with a number greater than

Usually an error is caused by a typing error or forgetting to enter a room/object/noun etc and thus easily traceable.



Mainly because, in order to give some sustenance to the game's title (which stands for loss of consciousness due to gravity) the cabinet you sat in lurched around like it had a rotweiler in its pants. Which left you to either marvel at the technology used or bring up your lunch all over the first person to congratulate you on your performance (or both, possibly). The CPC version won't shake you around all over the place, of course. If it does, consult an electrician.

So what can we expect from an 8-bit conversion of a game that owed much of its appeal in the arcades to innovations not recreatable on a home computer? We can expect anything we want. What we end up with is a pretty good, yet majorly repetitive, shoot-em-up. The screen shudders quite nicely though.

a small part of the arcade game's raison d'être into your home. There are a lot of waves of bad guys to face off against. There a three difficulty levels which, whilst not being any easier or more difficult than each other (!), do present an opportunity to vary the number and order of the enemies.

Bad news: The scrolling on the cliff sections is so jerky that it's almost sad. What are those bug-like things supposed to be? Your CPC is capable of much more than just playing games. Indeed, when the machine was first launched, it was intended as a serious all-rounder. Even now you can still get lots of software that lets you turn your CPC into a proper business machine...

## Accounts

There's more to the serious side of Amstrad computing than word processing. A whole plethora of packages can turn your plastic pal from a games playing gizmo into a business machine capable of cutting down the paperwork and making your life a whole lot easier. ADAM WARING is your guide...


ost serious programs require a disk drive. In fact you'd be wise to invest in one if you intend to use your machine for anything but a tiny amount of serious work. These programs generally need to store a lot of data, and you need an accessible and reliable place to store it.

#### HOME HELP

Business packages aren't just for business – they have plenty of good uses around the home too. Databases can keep records on practically anything you could want. You could put your cross-referenced record collection on a database, or store information about your rare Victorian pigmy figurines.

Accounts packages can be used to keep an eye on your bank balance – in fact some programs are especially tailored to look after the home finances.

Spreadsheets can be used to plan your spending. Now lets see, will I be able to by the electric muffin making machine and afford the holiday in Scunthorpe...?



 Spreadsheets act like highly-complex calculators, letting you carry out all sorts of heavyweight financial planning.



#### DATABASES

Keeping accurate records is an important part of an efficient business and a database is the electronic way to do this. They work a little like those card filing boxes that you can buy from WH Smith's; each 'card' holds a related set of information such as name, address and so on. These cards, or records, can then be flicked through to find the information you want.

But databases are much more powerful than that. Searches can be made on a variety of fields of information, so instead of looking through every single card to see who's paid their annual subscription for the butterfly collectors' club, you can simply specify the date joined and find it quickly that way.

Databases speed things up considerably. Huge amounts of information can be sifted through in seconds, and of course there's no bulky filing cabinets stuffed to overflowing with bits of paper.

There are generally two parts to a database. Firstly you have to define a template. This sets out the way the information is stored, so you can create fields for name, address, inside leg measurement etc.

The next step is to add the data. The information is typed into the spaces created when the record layout was designed. As they're created they're added to the back of the 'stack' of cards.

Now all the info's safely tucked away, you can browse through it at your leisure. You can search using a variety of criteria, more advanced programs allowing you to search for data adhering to specified limits and using wildcards.

#### **ACCOUNTS**

Keeping track of finances can be a bit of a headache, and it's always prudent to keep an eye on the cash flow. It's important to know who owes you how much money. Accounts packages let you keep tabs on your loot and an efficient system is absolutely vital. Most forms of business depend of a credit/debit system and this allows you to see who's honouring your payment by 30 days' terms. They'll alert you to who's not paying their bills and tell you when it's time to send the boys round.

Some will generate invoices for you too, so when you log in the bills it will print out the paperwork for you to send out with your orders.

It'll let you know when your bills are overdue as well, and will let you know when it's time for you to shell out for that consignment of rubber grommets from Thailand.

A good package will make things easier for your accountant too, and so you'll be getting



A spreadsheet makes this easy. Complex 'what-if' scenarios can be tried out quickly and easily. How does increasing the advertising spend effect things? You get instant results by simply tapping in the figures and seeing what the computer comes up with. Hmm, that leaves

It's like a huge sheet of paper with rows and columns. The information is tapped into what are known as 'cells' that lie at the intersections. A cell can contain text, numbers or a mathematical formula.

In actual use you don't see the formula on screen, though – whenever you make a change to your data, any calculations affected are updated and so you see what you can what's going on in an instant.

Basic mathematical functions are always supported, but more advanced packages can handle iterations (recursive formulas where a formula is consistently recalculated, based on the modified results).

Graphics, too are supported by some packages so you can see the results in a pretty, easy-to-understand format.

#### **Jargon-busting**

#### DATABASES

**Record** – name for each of the individual 'cards' used in a database.

Field – specific area on a record that refers to an area for data to be entered that's common to all the records used in the database.

Template – blank 'master' record that's used as a basis for all the information-storing records. It's designed in a separate section of the program and needs to be laid out before any data can be entered.

Search – facility for finding the information stored in the database quickly and easily. Search facilities vary in sophistication, but all will allow you to look for information in any of the fields on a record.

Credit – the money people owe you!
